Oil Club News - could be of interest to newer residents

We have 70 members at present and so far in 2015 we have ordered 72,000 litres of oil at an average price of 33.47p per litre before VAT which is 5% on fuel. The prices we have managed to agree for our members are on average 3p to 5p per litre less which is a saving of at least £2,160 which I am sure you will agree is a massive amount.

For those not already members, the oil is ordered every 2 months at set dates throughout the year. The minimum order quantity is 500 litres. The orders are collated and added to those from Osmotherley and Borrowby areas and a total price negotiated. I then send my order to the successful supplier and inform you of the price details and delivery. I am a volunteer and don't receive any payments or benefit other than the same price as everyone else in the club – just in case anyone was wondering.

Dog Problems

For two weeks from the middle of June, a deposit was left daily on the footpath alongside the school playing field. They were unusual in having a white tip at one end. Despite marking them with white paint and placing signs next to them, the deposits continued until suddenly stopping on Saturday 26th June. The current thinking is that they were left either by a wild animal or a large bird which has now moved elsewhere. Please be observant when using this footpath in case the problem starts to recur.

Elsewhere some very large, dark deposits are being left in the first section of Green Lane, and problems persist on the verges from Ingleby Cross towards and beyond the sewage works. Signs are being placed in these areas by local volunteers.

If you see anybody not clearing up after their dog, please report details to a member of the Parish Council so that appropriate action can be taken.

Dogs off the lead

Some residents are nervous when they encounter a dog off the lead, particularly if they are walking their own dog on the lead. Please be considerate and know where your dog is at all times. Dogs getting out from gardens and running off can be a nuisance to others, or a danger if they run on to a road.

"The Moors Bus Rides Again!"

The National Park Moorsbus Service of 30 years ended in 2013. However a new but reduced service has been re-started after a campaign by Friends of Moorsbus.



From 5th July until the end of September 2015, the Moorsbus Community Interest Company will run two Sunday/Bank Holiday buses. The buses and drivers are provided by Arriva North and cover Darlington, Teesside, Saltburn, Redcar, Guisborough, Stokesley, Osmotherley, Danby, Castleton, Northallerton, Thirsk, Sutton Bank, Hutton-le-Hole, Helmsley, Kirkbymoorside and Pickering.

These services are timed to meet those of other operators (EYMS, Coastliner, Arriva, Stephensons, Esk Valley Hopper, Northern Rail), with some through and shared ticketing to encourage more passengers onto all services. We also accept English Concessionary Bus Passes. Children travel free with a fare-paying adult.

Tight connection times with other services at Guisborough and Helmsley have meant we cannot, unfortunately, drive into Ingleby Cross this year. We hope that adjusted timings in 2016 will make it possible. For 2015, our Moors Endeavour bus does travel down the A172 and will pick up or drop off passengers who are bold enough to use this main road-side.

We are very grateful to the Parish Council of Ingleby Arncliffe for making a donation to help us re-start the Western route this year.

The 2015 Moorsbus services have been funded by donations from Parish Councils, from passengers, from the North Yorkshire Moors Association, from Thirsk Tourist Information Office, and from the fares and pass rebate collected in 2014.

We aim to increase spending in the visitor economy, encourage foreign tourists who often come without cars, increase health and well-being for all by enabling walking and days out, and reduce the traffic congestion and pollution caused by private cars in the National Park.




Ingleby Arncliffe School News
