Neighbourhood Plan

Progress Report

In February of this year we held an Open Meeting to announce the results of the parish Housing Needs Survey, and to propose a housing scheme that would meet the needs declared by the survey. (See Table on page 2)

By now we should have been holding another Open Meeting to discuss the sites available to us for the new housing scheme, but the initial assessment of the sites offered to Hambleton District Council by our parish landowners, has not been favourable. All sites offered to HDC under their "Call for Sites" exercise have now been assessed and the results published in a consultation document issued in May. Ways of accessing this document were published on the parish notice-boards.

Just to recap, our landowners offered three sites within the Hambleton District Council area and one site within the North York Moors National Park area. Of the two sites in the Hambleton area only one was offered for immediate use and two were offered for potential development in ten years time. The site within the NYMNP area was offered for immediate use.

The choice of sites for our first phase of new housing appeared to be between the two sites offered for immediate use, but the site within the HDC area has recently been declared by HDC as "Not a Preferred Site", an unfavourable assessment. The site within the NYMNP has not been subject to a similar assessment and we believe could be acceptable, if our Neighbourhood Plan declared it to be our first choice

The Steering Group have prepared and submitted to HDC a formal objection to the unfavourable site assessments, which will be examined this month as part of the Consultation process and the results of that review should be made known in July. By then we should know whether we have a choice of two sites for our first phase of new housing, or whether the site within the NYMNP area is our only option.

While this is going on, the Steering Group have arranged for a cost comparison of developing each of the two possible sites, which will help us to evaluate the pros and cons of each site, in terms of both cost and time. This is being carried out by a developer, at no cost to the project.

As soon as we have the results of the HDC Consultation exercise and the site development costs we will hold an Open Meeting to discuss the findings.

A group of passengers and supporters of public transport, all volunteers, came together to form two groups known as

Friends of Moorsbus and the Moorsbus Community Interest Company.

Their aim is to create an affordable transport system to and around the North York Moors and the surrounding area that allows people to travel without cars. They want to provide something for locals and visitors from home and abroad, on seven days a week, in all seasons. Check out their website and maybe plan a journey on the bus this summer. Service M5 goes along the A172 and will stop at the crossroads with Ingleby Cross for passengers to board. Details of its route are on page 7.

Friends of Moorsbus and Moorsbus C.I.C. depend on donations to keep services running and to start new ones. The fares and the low pass reimbursement pay for about half the bus costs each year, so they need to raise the rest. They have had wonderful support from passengers, Parish Councils, businesses, and other groups. The North Yorkshire Moors Association is kindly funding a bus for a fourth year in 2017.

(This Parish Council supports the Moorsbus. Perhaps some of you might consider becoming a Friend of Moorsbus. It only costs £5 a year. Full details on their website.)
