Some Community Events Back At Last!

Thursday November 4th was Polling Day in Ingleby Cross Village Hall

The results of the poll were as follows:

154 residents voted

145 voted in favour

9 voted against

The Neighbourhood Plan will now be recommended to HDC's Cabinet meeting on [7th December](#) and then to a Full Council meeting on [14th December](#) for adoption.



Village Potholes

You may have noticed that the potholes in the roads in and around our villages have become worse during the last 12 months. At least one of our residents has fallen over as a direct result of the state of the potholes.

There are several issues at play here - reporting the potholes, having them inspected and designated for repair, and getting them repaired properly.

Reporting:

In addition to individual residents reporting local potholes, one of our residents, Tim Roy, has been surveying the potholes twice a year for several years now, and reporting problems to North Yorkshire County Council via their website.

Inspection and designation for repair:

As recently as October 2020 most potholes reported were being repaired within a few weeks (although the repairs were not long-lasting – see later). Despite a large number of potholes being reported in April 2021 only one met the criteria to be repaired.

The same potholes (now larger/deeper) plus some new ones were reported in August 2021. Some were repaired within a week. All of the others were deemed not to have met the intervention level so no action was taken. For example, if you take a walk from the water tower in the direction of the A19 at the East Harlsey junction you will see where some potholes have been filled but adjacent ones have been left. Within a few months (or even weeks) those potholes will have become as large as the repaired ones.

Intervention level:

Until a few years ago the NYCC's website used to list the minimum depth and area of potholes that would be considered for repair. Now it is not as straightforward.

The following is an extract from the NYCC website (www.northyorks.gov.uk/potholes-and-road-condition-issues):

"How do we decide what to do about potholes?"

When we receive a report of a pothole, or when our highways officers identify an issue during routine checks, we carefully examine the problem to decide how urgently we need to act.

That usually depends on how serious the damage to the road is, and how busy the road is. It also depends on what is the best

use we can make of our resources, staff and repair vehicles.

*We prioritise the repair of potholes based on the level of risk to road users. If a pothole has been inspected and assessed as needing attention, it will be added to a programme of work. **We prioritise road repair based on a number of factors including the depth, size and location of the pothole on the road; the volume of traffic; and the speed of the road.***

Many of the potholes on the roads in our Parish are 2 to 3 times the old recommended depth, and more than 6 times the width. What else, apart from COVID 19 restrictions, could be behind the slow resolution to our problems?

The Darlington & Stockton Times dated 27th August 2021 reported that *"Earlier this year the Department for Transport announced the authority [NYCC] would receive £37m to maintain roads in 2021/22, £12.6m less than the previous year."* That amounts to a 25% reduction in road maintenance funding from central government.

Repair:

The Darlington & Stockton Times of 3rd September 2021 printed a letter from a Swainby resident complaining about the poor standard of road repairs in our area. He wrote: *"After watching first hand in Black Horse Lane, Swainby to Hutton Rudby one day NYCC Highways workmen filling in a huge line of potholes full of water with tarmac, this is not to be recommended, there was no keying the edges, no emptying or cleaning out and no tar based adhesive preparation before the tarmac fill. Not surprisingly this lasted less than a month."*

We have certainly witnessed the rapid degradation of pothole repairs in our parish that were carried out using a similar process.

Looking ahead:

Our Parish Council would like a more satisfactory resolution to our potholes problem. The subject of potholes is likely to be on the agenda for the November meeting. Also, our County Councillor will be given a guided tour of the worst areas, and will be asked to raise the subject with the Highways Department.

The Parish Council thanks Tim for carrying out this monitoring on everyone's behalf and for noticing and reporting other things which need attention around the Parish from time to time.

Noise Problems

The “stay at home” regime at the beginning of the Covid-19 pandemic gave many people an opportunity to focus more on home improvements and to spend extra time working or having work done in their gardens. Some of these activities have continued into this year but the downside has been the occasional unwelcome effect it had on neighbours. The Parish Council was contacted for advice on at least one occasion when the disturbance on a Bank Holiday was so great that it had ruined a much anticipated family visit. Sometimes noise is unavoidable but giving notice and a word of warning in advance might be appreciated by your neighbours.

Even simple things like grass cutting can be irritating if begun very early in the morning - particularly at weekends.

There are guidance leaflets on Hambleton District Council’s website so if you are having work done by a contractor you can check up on such things as the hour they are permitted to start noisy work, and if there are restrictions on Sundays and Bank Holidays work.

One useful leaflet for Dog Owners, *“Is your Dog Barking too much?”* can be downloaded and has some good advice. Pet owners may be so used to their dogs barking that they do not realise it is creating a nuisance for their neighbours.

If you do not feel that you can discuss a noise problem with your neighbour the course of action is to report it to the District Council.

Speeding through the Villages

The Parish Council had to suspend the Speed Watch checks during Covid, but was in any case very short of volunteers. At present the equipment is with Crathorne Parish. Police Speed checks on Cross Lane have never recorded speeds high enough to warrant the introduction of a 20 mph limit. We are keeping this under constant review.

Online shopping has greatly increased the number of delivery vehicles driving around our village streets. Excessive speeds on the Main Street, where we have a number of families with small children, is a particular cause for concern. Please will everyone respect this and keep their own speed down. Reporting a driver speeding whilst making a delivery is one course of action which can be taken by residents.

Recreation Area Work Party 25th September 2021

Many hands make light work and the villagers turned out in force to prove just how right that is!

Visitors will see that the large pile of debris that had built up over the last couple of years has now gone, the wildflower area has been cleared and the adjacent hedges have been cut back and the hedge alongside the footpath has been tamed and is now looking very neat.



The Recreation Area has now been truly “put to bed for the winter”.



The bonfire was checked for hedgehogs and moved a few yards to allow the frogs to escape before being set alight. It was maintained

throughout the day and consumed the vast amount of material that came from the hedge cutting and ground clearing.



The **Van der Beken** family made a huge contribution all day, **Kjell**, **Kimry** and **Naina** (who proved to be an expert at fanning the bonfire flames). **Kate** and **David Cook** with **Lily** and **Molly**, and **Linda** with grandson **Finlay** who moved mountains of cuttings across the field to the bonfire, later assisted by parents **Joanne** and **Joe Potter**.

Newcomers to the village **Tony** and **Ann Hui**, and **Graeme Calder**, were introduced to others and put to work on the list of jobs. We only hope that we haven't put them off volunteering in the future!

People returning to help included **Liz** and **Steve Marwood** (who runs a mean bonfire), **Ann** and **Bill Dewing** (who is tall enough to cut high hedges!) and **Janice Beautiman**, shanghaied by Ruth on her way to post a letter and who spent the rest of the afternoon hauling cuttings to the fire!



The children helped by watering the baby oak trees that Janice had provided for the Recreation area and they certainly appreciated the cakes provided by Ruth!



It was noted that **Alma Fox** had already started on the task of sorting out the willow dens that have both put on a large amount of growth over the last year and this work will continue as time allows.

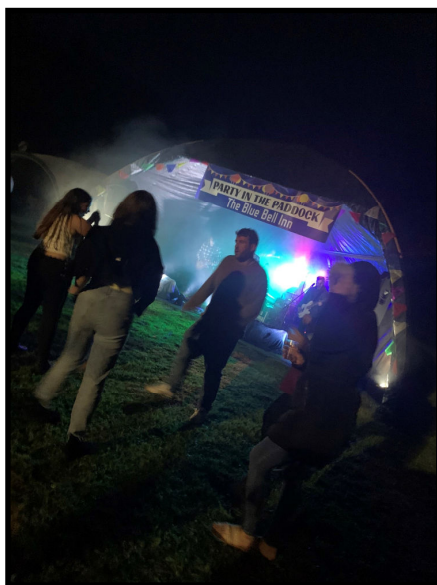

Life Saving Defibrillators in our Parish

This is a reminder that we have two community defibrillators in the following locations.



This one is down at Ingleby Cross , on the wall to the right of the Village Hall main entrance.

The other one is situated at the Atkinson's coach depot on the Main Street (by kind permission) - in the top village - Ingleby Arncliffe. It is just round the stone pillar next to the vehicle door.

There are clear instructions on each defibrillator case on how to access the equipment in case of emergency. The advice given by the NHS North Yorkshire Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG) is to try to have a second person with you if at all possible, or shout loudly for help.

Calling "FIRE" is the most effective.
